

"Be sure to your choice and decisions that you are going to make and take your education seriously," said Sister Maria Lina R. Despojo, OSA, the President, and Dean.


The beginning of the College Department for Academic Year 2021-2022 has set the goals towards achieving the success of the LCC-C community.



# 15th Hospitality EdukCircle deemed successful

Chairman Director Dr. Alexander Baltazar drove the virtual 15th Edukcircle International Convention on Hospitality and Tourism to success last October 2, 2021.

With a total of 518 participants from 42 colleges and universities, the event lasted for 9 hours in the Zoom webinar setting. Attendees consist of students and academe specializing in Hospitality and Tourism.

Six (6) speakers from all around the globe shared their insights on different topics related to the industry.

Hosted by Dr. Alexander Baltazar, the convention started with a few briefings about the Zoom webinar option. He also acknowledged that present panelists from different colleges and universities, including La Consolacion College-Caloocan, will be heard after a speaker's presentation.

It was then discussed by the first speaker, Dr. Breffni Noone, Associate Professor at Pennsylvania State University, the topic on revenue management and profit optimization during the pandemic. By filling in the gaps with her data, she forecasted "consumer spending in the US 2022 will be its highest since World War II" verbatim.

The second speaker, Dr. Jeffrey Beck, Associate Professor at Michigan State University, stated that in the industry, "action-based is what really matters and at the end of the day, it's [about] doing the right thing." non-verbatim.

During panel interaction, Dr. Beck praised the Filipino workforce with the words "Filipino work ethics serve the very best of customers" verbatim.

The day went ahead with the third speaker Dr. Michael McCall, NAMA Endowed Professor of Hospitality Business; Michigan State University. He then presented and wrapped up his talk with "Loyalty programs are not about giving discounts, but more on engaging with customers." non-verbatim.

After which, the EdukCircle team presented a thesis study from the University of Baguio and Ramon Magsaysay State University.

Hosting substitution by Ms. Toni Pua, the resumption of the session came in with another speaker, Dr. Jonathan Lockwood Sutton, Instructor at Hong Kong Polytechnic University. He then talked about the implication of technology within the hospitality industry, moving forward with the argument of technology being functional vs. "just being used to it."

The fifth speaker, Dr. Sandeep Basnyat, Assistant Professor at Macao Institute for Tourism Studies, stated, "You are driven by your own necessities" verbatim. He pointed topics on the Tourism and Hospitality industry being mobile in labor.

Dr. Peter Lugosi, Professor at Oxford Brookes University, being the last speaker, covered migration, labor mobility, and hospitality employment, wherein the most highlighted parts were the importance of occupational and organizational mediators of migrant experiences.

Before the program ended, Ms. Toni Pua gave gratitude to all speakers, panelists, team, and attendees of the 15th EdukCircle. She then announced the 10 winners of 100-peso load from the social media follow and like raffle draw.


# Guidance and Evaluation Center steers Unified LCC Resiliency webinar to success

rganized by the Tourism Management Travel Club, La Consolacion College-Caloocan (LCC-C) celebrates World Tourism Day held on October 22,


2021 via Zoom.



As per the Commission on Election (COMELEC), over 61M Filipinos can cast their ballots for National and Local Election in May 2022.



"Saints are not perfect models, but are people whose lives God has crossed." - Pope Francis.

Saints are part of the catholic religion; they are present not to be worshipped but to honor the life of holiness they lived and their intercessory prayer. It is said that saints above all are brothers and sisters "who have welcomed the light of God into their hearts and have passed it on to the world, each one according to their tone."

The road to sainthood isn't easy; it takes a lot of time, resources, and patience for the advocates of a candidate's sainthood. The process would take years, decades, and even centuries just to gather the information that can help verify the way of life of the candidate.

The tedious process starts after five (5) years upon the candidate's death; however, the Pope can waive this in some instances. The bishop of the diocese where the person died can authorize an investigation into whether the individual would be a good and worthy candidate for sainthood.

If the person qualifies, the bishop can declare the person as 'Servant of God.' The bishop will then issue a request to the Congregation for the Causes of Saints at the Vatican City for permission to officially open a case.






The candidate should have a widespread reputation of holiness, and intercessory prayer, which the Church will verify. A theological committee will be formed to look into the candidate's life, including their publications and, if obtainable, the testimonies of witnesses, both positive and negative, and make sure that nothing is disqualifying in the candidate's life.

After the investigation, all the materials and information gathered would be presented and reviewed by the Congregation for the Causes of Saints; the intercessory pass their findings to the Pope if the candidate qualifies. The Pope then declares the candidate to be called 'Venerable' if he agrees with the congregation.

Beatification would be the next step. This can go in two ways: (1) The Pope declares that the candidate is a martyr for their intercessory faith; (2) A proof of miracle in the candidate's intercession. If the candidates have died of martyrdom, they do not need a miracle to be beatified.

Beatification of a 'Venerable Servant of God' is usually celebrated with a Mass normally held at St. Peter's Square in Vatican City and some instances outside the Holy See presided by the Holy Father. It is considered that the beatified candidates have entered heaven, and they are now called "Blessed."

The last but crucial step is the Canonization, declaring a deceased person as officially recognized 'Saint.' To be canonized and announced as a saint, there should be a miracle that should take place after the candidate is declared 'Blessed'.

"Vaccines Can Save Lives"— It's been a year and a half since the world was shaken by the pandemic. COVID-19 dominated the world in 2020, where many lives have been affected, and the whole world was put down on its knees. Everyone's lives are put on hold to stop the spread of the virus. After tons of research and clinical trials, the international pharmaceutical industries have finally produced a vaccine. Vaccine distribution in the Philippines started in 2021 with the A1 (healthcare workers) and A2 (senior citizen) categories.

Vaccine's efficacy fits the overall percentage reduction of the disease in a group of people who got vaccinated through the process of a clinical trial. It is also tested by comparing the rates of two groups that received two different vaccines. The difference in finding the vaccine's effectiveness is that it calculates the vaccine's effectiveness rate under real-life scenarios and not in a clinical trial while considering the space and number factors of the study. The effectiveness of a vaccine is determined by how well it safeguards the entire community.

Like any other vaccine, the COVID-19 vaccine works by imitating a disease-causing infectious agent (e.g. viruses, bacteria, or other microorganisms) and infects the body and immune system, causing your antibodies to respond and recognize the virus. However, it also produces long-term immune memory, a trained response that is faster and more effective than the initial contact. This memory may continue for months, if not years, depending on the person's immune response and memory established by the actual virus infection.

The frequently asked question is, "Are Covid-19 Vaccines Safe?". The answer is yes; vaccines undergo intensive training in clinical trials to demonstrate that they fulfill safety and efficacy standards. Fitting reasonable requirements, a vaccine can only be validated by The World Health Organization (WHO) and country regulatory organizations. The COVID-19 vaccine carries a few side effects (e.g. flu, dizziness, cravings, drowsiness, etc.) expected for your body's way to respond as a new agent enters your system.

Being vaccinated doesn't make you invincible of the virus; it helps your body prevent acute symptoms that the virus may cause. However, staying at home is still a must for vaccinated people as they could be the ones carrying the virus and passing it on to vulnerable ones. As for that, we must continue to take precautionary steps to combat the virus.









Some people would jokingly say, "They'll become a zombie once vaccinated", and this statement spreads fake news and rumors that could scare people from getting their vaccines. However, the strategy of the Philippine government by giving outside privileges to vaccinated people has helped to drive the Filipinos into getting their shots to practice these perks.

But then again, if you haven't been vaccinated, think about the risk you're putting your family and friends in. Don't be a spreader, get vaccinated, and be better.

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# #LigtasNaBalikEskw KEPYOU HOPES UI ON'T LE YOUR GUARD by Kenneth Jordan D. Carpio

ne year and counting – the number we have been tallying since face-to-face classes have shifted to distance and flexible learning modalities due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The given questions, is the Philippines ready to reopen schools for face-to-face classes? Are we prepared to handle any risk it may cause? What grounds does the Philippine government consider in allowing it?

As of September 2021, the Philippines and Venezuela are the only countries in the world that have not reopened schools for face-to-face classes due to the pandemic. Because of this, youth organizations and student activists have been rallying with #LigtasNaBalikEskwela – advocacy for the safe reopening of face-to-face classes in the country.

In the past few days, the #LigtasNaBalikEskwela campaign had become noisy due to the announcement released on October 6 by the Department of Education (DepEd) Undersecretary, Nepomuceno Malaluan, informing the public with DepEd's plan of starting its pilot run for limited faceto-face classes on the 15th of November, 2021. According to DepEd, the said pilot run is weighed with considering the recommendations from child health experts, the Department of Health (DOH), Inter-Agency Task Force for the Management of Emerging Infectious Disease (IATF-EID), and other concerned groups.



Meanwhile, the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) promised that they will propose the reopening of face-to-face classes for all degree programs. With the approval of IATF-EID, CHED allowed limited face-to-face classes in selected degree programs, including health sciences and engineering.

CHED Chairman Prospero de Vera III said on Malacañang press briefing on October 11, limited face-to-face classes in all degree programs could be possible in the coming months, particularly in areas with low COVID-19 cases and high inoculation rates. At present, 21,000 students were vaccinated with no recorded infection cases from nearly 200 universities all over the country.

The Philippine government and education governing bodies, DepEd and CHED, must listen to the recommendations from health experts, IATF-EID, and DOH, wherein more studies must be conducted to ensure students' safety and success limited face-to-face classes. Next, ensure that the schools, colleges, and universities are ready for a conducive learning environment that observes health protocols and seriously implements them. Lastly, they must validate that students are fully vaccinated for added protection.

In conclusion, we REALLY NEED to reopen schools for face-to-face classes. If malls, restaurants, amusement parks are open, why not schools? Although undeniably, the Philippines has a long way to go in addressing the pandemic, many students and teachers cannot afford to have another school year of distance and flexible learning modalities. Some degree programs at the tertiary level require fundamental skills demonstration; the well-being of teachers and students has been compromised by this mode of learning; academic integrity has become a prevalent issue recently. On the other hand, we cannot afford infection among students and teachers.

The reopening of face-to-face classes is a factor that will affect quality education, considering the safety of the students and teachers. It is a collaborative effort to make sure that limited face-to-face class is safe and successful. Let's all aim for a safe reopening of face-to-face classes in the country.






When the baby started growing up, the mother never told her daughter about mirrors; these were not allowed in their house.

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

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
